

General Rules ~ Updates to the information found in this catalog will be found on the webpage. Service animals only allowed on fairgrounds by patrons. NO PETS ON THE FAIRGROUNDS.

Upon entry of any fair contests you give permission to publish any placings received, and pictures/video/audio to be used in any marketing materials. If you do not agree to this photo release, please stop in the main office. Entries are limited to person or groups residing in Pennsylvania.

1. Exhibitors may pick up entry tags for entries Saturday or Sunday when entering exhibits. The tags must be completed by the exhibitor with the Department, Class, Lot and exhibit description, and include the exhibitors number, name and address. Tags must be attached to the exhibit and exhibits placed in the appropriate building. Exhibit entry times are Saturday 9am - 5pm and Sunday 11am - 5pm.
2. Pre-registration is welcome but not required. Exhibits must remain at the fair until the pickup times on Sunday and Monday after the fair.
3. Exhibits are considered "entered" when they are placed in the buildings.
4. Game and contest participants must register on the day of the event unless a pre-registration form is offered.
5. All exhibits must be entered in the name of the owner or producer since last year's fair.
6. Exhibitors may have only one entry in a class, except livestock.
7. The Beaver Community Fair Association takes the precaution to protect exhibits by providing watchmen at times when the buildings are open to the public. The fair, its staff, and volunteers are not responsible for items that may be damaged at the fair.
8. Exhibits not properly entered will be re-entered and judged in the proper classes at department superintendent and judge's discretion.
9. Exhibitors who pre-register can request to receive exhibit tags by mail. The cost is \$1.00 for every 10 tags requested.
10. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide changes to address, phone number, etc. with the fair office. It is also the exhibitors responsibility to verify their exhibitor number for entries.
11. Personal kitchen appliances will not be allowed in the barns during fair week without approval of the fair president.
12. No open flames on the fairgrounds.
13. The Fair Board reserves the right to prohibit the sale of any items at our vendor stands that are deemed unfit.
14. Exhibits can be removed after fair at the following times - Sunday 2-4 pm, Monday 5-7 pm.

Judging

1. An exhibit may not be entered in the miscellaneous class if the premium list provides a class in which it can be entered.
2. Judges place entries by merit, even where there is no competition in a class.
3. The opinion of the judges shall be final, except in such cases where it is afterwards discovered that the entry is not according to the governing rules and regulations. In this case the management shall have the final word.
4. The names of all exhibitors shall be concealed until the judging is finished.
5. Only exhibits listed in the premium list will be judged.

6. Exhibits entered with more or less specimens than required will be disqualified. Exhibitors must check for the number of specimens needed when entries are made.
7. Judges have the right to award an exhibit with a Best of Show Ribbon. Not all categories may receive this award.

Premiums

1. No premiums are guaranteed in classes with less than three (3) entries.
2. The judges' book is the final say of placing. No premiums will be altered due to a sticker placing.
3. All premium checks will be mailed and must be cashed within 90 days of the date issued

General Animal Rules

1. New Rule, any exhibitor wishing to enter an animal into any youth/market livestock class must not have reached 21 years of age as of January 1 prior to that years fair. This rule will take effect for all species in 2024, EXCEPT MARKET STEERS.

2. All animal shows will be considered "all natural". Any artificial means to change the form, shape or functionality of an animal will disqualify it from competition.

3. 4-H and Vocational Division is open to Snyder County 4-H and FFA members only.

4. 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitors must be taking the project during the current year and have the books evaluated or approved by the organizations advisor/educator in order to participate in 4-H/FFA related fair events.

5. Any animal of unthrifty nature, unsuitable condition, or showing signs of sickness may be removed from the fair as deemed necessary by the Livestock Manager or Fair President.

6. Swine must arrive at the fair Saturday, 6-8 pm for check in.

7. All beef, sheep, and goats must arrive at the fairgrounds from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm Sunday for check in.

8. Dairy animals may arrive Sunday, 9:00 am to 3:00 pm and Monday 9:00 am to 6:30 pm for check in.

9. Rabbits must arrive Sunday for check in and weighing 10 am – 12 pm.

10. Poultry must arrive Sunday for check-in and weighing at 12 pm.

11. Health Paperwork for Animal Exhibition:

1. Swine : Before unloading, a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 14 days of the fair, must be presented at check in .

2. Poultry: An Owner-Endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health chart or CVI), must accompany all poultry. As well as Avian Influenza test results within the 30 day rule. Poultry see Dept 10 Class 80.

3. All other animals must present with a CVI issued within 30 days of the fair, (except rabbits), and will be verified before unloading animals.

12. Market animals are to be shown and presented for show/sale by the exhibitor. In case of two entries in the same class or illness of the exhibitor, another 4-H or FFA member may show the animal. Any 4-H or FFA member unable to show their animal, either at the show or sale, for any reason must submit a letter to the Livestock Manager seeking permission to have them shown by another 4-H or FFA member. An adult may not present animals entered in a youth competition to the judge.

13. Ownership: To be eligible for competition, whether singly or in groups, animals must be bona fide property of the exhibitor by July 15 as evi-denced by their registration paper issued by their US Breed Association. No photostats or other copies will be accepted. Pending transfers will not be accepted. Exhibitors are advised to keep registration certificates available at all times.

14. 4-H members leasing animals must have the appropriate lease paperwork completed and approved by the 4-H Educator on or before June 1. FFA members leasing animals must have the project as part of their AET and it must be approved by the advisor.

15. All animals must be owned by the exhibitor unless a leased project, with required paperwork.

16. Exhibitors and a parent/guardian are required to attend one of the following exhibitor meetings:

Sunday 3:00 pm, or Monday 7:00 pm

17. Exhibitors staying on the grounds overnight must register at the livestock office. Exhibitors under 18 years of age must complete a permission slip found at beaverfair.org and submit to the livestock office. All exhibitors must check in with the nightly chaperone at 10 pm. Only exhibitors are eligible to complete an overnight form. Approval to stay overnight will be granted on the accessibility of chaperones.
18. All dairy and livestock exhibitors must supply feed and bedding for their animals, as well as the needed equipment. Care for animals must be provided daily.
19. If your fair pen is found to be in an unacceptable condition, the Livestock Manager and Sale Manager will tie a red ribbon on your pen and you will be notified. If after 24 hours your pen hasn't been cleaned, you will be assessed a \$25 fee per occurrence. When a pen is flagged the exhibitor must report to the Livestock office when cleaned. A fair official must check the pen. Flags may be removed by a fair official **only**. At the discretion of the Livestock Manager, Fair Manager, and Fair President, pens can be sent home.
20. Exhibitors with animals in the swine, lamb, and goat pens will be required to clean out their pens before Sunday night. Rabbit and Poultry exhibitor pens must be cleaned by Saturday night. When all Bovine are removed, the exhibitor is expected to move their bedding 2ft from the wall or center divider of their stall. Pens not cleaned will result in a loss of premium checks.
21. Barn Cleaning starts promptly at 12:00 PM Sunday. All Tack and Animals **MUST** be REMOVED before noon Sunday.
22. No animal shall be on the premises if it has been administered a forbidden substance in any manner. A forbidden substance is any stimulant, depressant, or local anesthetic which might affect the behavior of the animal. No drugs are permitted to be administered to any animal without permission of the department superintendent, livestock manager or an accredited veterinarian.
23. Entries will be accepted on a first come, first served basis due to limited space. Exhibitors are asked to use sound judgment as to the number of entries because of this limited space. Space will be allocated on a square footage per animal basis with Snyder County Youth Livestock Sale entries receiving first priority, and then in this order: youth breeding (6 per exhibitor with a total of 12 per farm, firm or family), Open breeding (6 per exhibitor with a total of 12 per farm, firm or family), and out of county open breeding.
24. In the event of the death of an animal, the exhibitor must provide an autopsy by an accredited veterinarian and subsequent test to determine the cause of the animals' death.
25. Stall assignments will be made by the Livestock/Dairy Manager and Committee. Exhibitors and parents may request special placement, but should know this may not be possible.
26. No stalls will be used for tack or feed unless assigned and approved by the Livestock Manager and Committee.
27. All animal entry forms (copies of Official Breed Association Registration forms for all purebred, non-market animals, and entry fees, except market entries must be attached) must be filled out and mailed to Livestock Manager Matt Brandt. Please send them to: Matt Brandt, 1692 Neitz Valley Road, Selinsgrove, PA 17870 by August 1. Or Dropped in the Fairgrounds Drop Box **ONLY**.
28. September 1 is the final date to scratch an animal. "No-show" animals will need a Veterinarians certificate to indicate why the animal is not being exhibited, or a \$25 fee will be deducted from exhibitors premium check.
29. Animals must be double tied with neck chains/collars and a halter.

30. Check out will begin at the close of the tractor pulls or 11 pm at the descretion of the fair board.

7 Animals other than those appearing in the premium list will not be accepted. Dairy exhibits will remain in their pens or stalls until the livestock manager dismisses them on Saturday. Exhibitors will forfeit all premiums if their animals are removed prior to this dismissal. Animals must be checked by department personnel before animal entries are unloaded or removed.

8 Dairy animals may arrive Sunday, 9 am until 3 pm and Monday 9 am until 6:30 pm for check in

9 If milking cows arrive on Sunday please notify the Livestock Manager

10 Junior Grand and Reserve Champion, Seniro Grand and Reserve Champion and Supreme Champion winning entries will receive non-monetary awards based on qualified entries to the class.

11 The milking parlor will be open for use between the hours of 5:00 - 7:00 both morning and evening with the following exceptions: Wednesday (open anytime, please be mindful of the Beef Show exhibitors) and Thursday it will be open in the evening from 4:00-6:00 to accommodate the Livestock sale.

Youth Livestock Sale - Department 10

1. See General Animal Rules.
2. Exhibitors must be members of the Snyder County 4-H Club and/or FFA Chapter. Exhibitors need to have taken the project they enter in 4-H/FFA during the current year in the species in order to exhibit at fair.
3. A 4-H member is enrolled when the member's enrollment is approved by the county 4-H educator. A 4-H member must be in "good standing" with the 4-H office to exhibit at the fair.
4. FFA record books must be verified by the advisor, for the exhibitor to be eligible to show during the current fair. Advisors will provide a list to the Livestock Manager by September 4.
5. 4-H animal projects books must be judged at or prior to 4-H Round-up. Those failing to have books judged before Beaver Fair will be ineligible for competition in youth classes and also ineligible for the Youth Livestock Sale. An alternate project animal for all species may be tagged and exhibitor's choice of animals brought to the fair.

6. An alternate project animal for all species may be tagged and exhibitors choice of animals brought to the fair. A family alternate is no longer available, instead alternates must be registered to an exhibitor and records kept on that animal.
7. **All animals must be castrated and cattle must be dehorned by a method chosen by the exhibitor prior to arrival at the fairgrounds on tagging day. Animals not castrated and dehorned will not be tagged and therefore will be unable to be entered for the show.**
8. If during the check of the animal upon arrival at the fair the exhibitor must realize that animals found to have testicular tissue will be sent home.
9. **All chutes and generators need to be in designated areas. The fair has the right to remove any generators causing undo noise.**

Fair Arrival and Animal Check In and Weighing

1. There will be no re-weighs during weigh-in Sunday of fair.
2. **Exhibitors may show and sell a maximum of 6 lots from the following:** 1 steer; 1 dairy feeder; 2 lambs; 2 hogs; 2 goats, 1 meat pen (rabbit), 1 single fryer(rabbit), 1 meat pen (poultry) and 1 roaster (poultry).
3. Swine must arrive on the fairgrounds Saturday between 6 and 8 pm. All other livestock sale animals must arrive on the fairgrounds on Sunday between the hours of 9 am and 3 pm. Only the maximum number of animals eligible to be exhibited per species may be brought to the fairgrounds. Animals designated as alternates may not be weighed if those chosen do not meet weight requirements.
4. All livestock will be weighed at the fair according to the following schedule:
 - Swine 8:00 pm Saturday
 - Rabbits 10 am – 12 noon Sunday
 - Poultry 12 noon Sunday
 - All others will start at 4 pm. Sunday
5. **Weights of animals must be within a specified range at weigh in as follows:**
 - Market Hogs (barrows or gilts only) 220-290 lbs
 - Market Lambs (wethers or ewes only) 85lbs-no top weight
 - Market Goats (wethers or does only) 60-110 lbs
 - Market Steers 900-1500 lbs
 - Dairy Feeder Steer (steers only) 350-650 lbs
 - Rabbits (pen of three) not more than 70 days old 3 1/2-5 1/2 lbs each
 - Rabbits (single fryer) not more than 70 days old 3 1/2-5 1/2 lbs each
 - Poultry (Pen) (not more than 70 days old) 6.5-8.5 lbs each
 - Poultry (Roaster) (not more than 70 days old) 7-9 lbs each

6. Weight classes will be designated after weigh in due to weight variances and number of entries within each weight division.

7. All animals must be dry for weigh ins.

8. Lambs must be slick shorn to 1/2 inch or less with the exception of the leg wool.

9. **If clipping, swine may be clipped to no less than 3/4 inch.**

Sale

1. Any and all animals that are not taken to the show ring due to the animal not being controllable will not be sold during the sale.

2. Sale start time will be Thursday of the fair at 6:30 pm. following any special presentations at 6:00 pm.

3. Underweight and overweight animals will NOT be sold during the Livestock Sale.

4. **Sale animals for which the fair provides transportation , will be removed from the fairgrounds beginning at 9 pm Saturday night by the fairs designated haulers. Other animals will be released after the tractor pulls or 11 pm at the discretion of the Sale Manager, unless there are fair designated haulers who need to load out.**

5. **Exhibitors will be limited to show and sell 6 lots. (2022 this will change to 6 youth lots)**

6. Exhibitors must be present during animal load out for verification of animal destination.

6 All poultry exhibitors must supply one week's supply of feed for their animals. Care for animals must be provided twice daily.

Health

- Exhibitors must check the current health regulations and inoculation schedules with the Superintendent at least 6 weeks prior to show date.
- All birds must bear an official PDA-issued crimp style or butt end style leg identification band.
- An Owner-Endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health chart or CVI), must accompany all poultry. Own-er-Endorsed Poultry Health Certificates can be found on the fair's website.
- All birds must come from Pullorum-typhoid free flock (present flock card or certificate from hatchery) or test negative for Pullorum-typhoid.
- All birds must test negative for Avian Influenza and be tested by a CPT or Category 2 Accredited Veterinarian. Avian Influenza test results must be completed within the 30- day rule.
- All test results must accompany the birds upon arrival at the fair.
- Official Poultry Leg Band Record must be completed at the same time of blood testing and leg banding. The CPT or Category 2 Accredited Veterinarian must complete and sign this record. Forms must accompany birds upon check in at the fair. Forms not completed and signed at check-in will deem the bird's ineligible for competition.
- All poultry animals must arrive on the fairgrounds on Sunday at 12 pm. Only the maximum number of animals eligible to be exhibited may be brought to the fairgrounds.

CORN SHELLING

1. The object of the "CORN SHELLING" contest is to shell by hand, the most corn within a one minute period.
2. The corn will be weighed to determine the winner. The highest weight wins.
3. Only the corn which falls directly into the container will be weighed.
4. Contestants must shell the corn in their bare hands. No gloves or other aids may be used.
5. A "shell-off" will be held to break ties.

WATER HAULING

1. The object of "WATER HAULING" is to carry as much water as possible from the water trough to the container within a thirty (30) second time period.
2. The course distance (length of haul) shall be forty (40) feet.
3. The contestant that hauls the greatest amount of water, by weight, will be declared the winner.
4. In the event of a tie, a "Haul-Off" elimination will be held.

NAIL DRIVING

1. The object of "NAIL DRIVING" is to drive a nail as far as possible into a block of wood with two (2) hammer blows.
2. Safety glasses or goggles must be worn by contestants. Contestants wearing prescription glasses must wear goggles.
3. The nail will be started in the block of wood by the contest official.
4. The nail may not be touched or held in any manner except for two (2) hammer blows.
5. The winner will be determined by measuring the length of the nail protruding from the wooden block. The shortest distance protruding will determine the winner.
6. In the event of a tie, a "Nail Drive-Off" will be held.

SEED SPITTING CONTEST

1. The object of the contest is to "SPIT" a seed as far as possible.
2. Contestants will select one 1 seed and will only be allowed one try.

3. The contestant "spitting" the seed the greatest distance is the winner.
4. All measurements will be made from a marked point on the foul line.
5. Any contestant who crosses the foul line will be disqualified.
6. The seed must land in front of the foul line to qualify for measurement.
7. Contestants may not chew gum while competing.
8. In the event of a tie, a "spit-off" will be held.

GRAIN BAGGING CONTEST

1. This event is a team event. A team shall consist of two (2) contestants.
2. "Grain" will be carried from the "grain" pile by one 1 of the two (2) contestants to the bag which will be held open by the other contestant on the team. The bag will be located at the foul line. On a switch signal from the contest official the teammates will switch positions and continue to bag the "grain" until the signal is given to stop.
3. A weight measurement will determine the winner.
4. Bare hands only may be used to transfer grain from the pile to the bag.
5. In the event of a tie, there will be a "bag-off".
6. Each contestant may compete on one team only.

KIDDIE PEDAL POWER TRACTOR PULL

1. Register one hour prior to starting time.
2. Contest is open to youngsters from 3-10 years of age.
3. Boys and girls compete against each other by age.
4. Contestants must have an exhibitors number to enter, they can be obtained at the fair office.
5. The distance each contestant pulls the sled will be measured and recorded.
6. Weight is added to the sled as required to determine each category's winner.
7. The use of hands to assist in rolling the rear tires is prohibited.
8. All movement of the tractor must be forward by pedaling (leg power only).
9. Backing up and snatching of the sled is prohibited.
10. Contestants will be disqualified for removing feet from the pedals and touching the surface of the track.
11. The winner of each class is determined by the contestant who pulls the most weight the longest distance by pedaling the tractor.
12. A pull off will be held when two (2) or more contestants perform a full pull. Additional weight will be added to the transfer sled for the pull-off.
13. Judges decisions are final. Parents of contestants must register and sign a waiver of liability for each child who competes.
14. A standard size pedal tractor with two (2) drive wheels will be furnished.
15. The tractor will be hitched to a special weight transfer sled. The sled is equipped with a weight box to which weights are added as needed.

Rules and Tips for Displaying Vegetables

1. Refer also to General Rules.
2. When choosing vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest price at a retail market.
3. Select specimens that are true-to-type. Do not mix varieties.
4. Pick specimens of the same size, shape, and maturity level. Medium-sized specimens are usually best.
5. Select specimens free from soil or debris from insect or mite skins, honeydew, or excrement. Specimens may be washed or rinsed.
6. Select specimens free from bruises, cuts, or other mechanical damage. (including scrubbing marks)
7. Harvest specimens with shears. Wrap specimens individually for safe transport to fair.
8. Enter only the number of specimens called for in the premium list. Entries with an incorrect number of specimens will be disqualified.
9. Entries of root crops, such as beets, carrots, radishes, rutabagas, and turnips, should be topped, leaving petioles at a length of 1-2 inches.
10. Remove stems from tomatoes to avoid skin punctures.
11. Specimens with rot or any other damage that attracts insects will be removed by the fair association. If this occurs before judging, the entry will be disqualified.
12. Exhibitors must accurately identify their own entries as to varieties and types. Exhibits entered into the wrong class may be disqualified.

6. All posters will become the property of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture for possible future promotional activities for the Pennsylvania Farm Show and Pennsylvania State Association of County Fairs. Any duplication of posters from previous years will be disqualified. Posters will not be returned via mail. Contestants may arrange to have their entries returned following the PA Farm Show through their individual fairs; however, the posters must be picked up in person at the PSACF Convention or Spring Zone Meetings.

Open Youth & Adult Fun Horse Show

1. All horses must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) signed by an accredited veterinarian. The CVI must be issued within the 60 days prior to the date of arrival at the show. Present CVI at registration.
2. All judging decisions are final.
3. All entries must be made at least two classes ahead.
4. Horses showing signs of infectious or contagious diseases will not be permitted entry to the fair.
5. There will be a \$5.00 entry fee per class.
6. All horses must stay in the designated area. Any horse exhibitors found on the mid-way with horses will forfeit any premium winnings.
7. One rider per event. Horses may be shared among riders per event.

Safety Rules

1. The Horse Show Committee and/or Judge have the authority to disqualify any exhibitor for inability to control his/her horse. This is for the safety of all exhibitors.
2. All entries shall be for a single rider only (with the exception of lead line and relay race). No person shall be on a horse with a child, or another horse and rider combination shall not ride the pattern with the child.
3. If your horse is known to kick, please tie a RED RIBBON in the tail to alert other riders.
4. Riders are NOT ALLOWED to enter or leave the arena at a run in the speed events. Horses will enter the arena at a walk and the gate will be closed immediately. The gate will not be opened until the horse has stopped.
5. Do not run your horse outside of the arena. Horses must be ridden with a bridle and reins at all times on the Beaver Community Fair Grounds. This is for the safety of all exhibitors and spectators.
6. NO STALLIONS shall be shown by a youth under the age of eighteen (18) in any class.

Equipment Rules

1. In any class the Judge or Show Committee shall have the authority to require removal or alteration of any piece of equipment which is unsafe or which is believed to be inhumane.
2. Hackamores, tie downs, running martingales and roping/barrel reins are prohibited in walk-trot and pleasure classes. Crops, bats, whips, or "over and unders" are allowed in speed events only. No bareback pads are allowed in any class.

Egg & Spoon: The rider will hold an egg in a spoon while riding his/her horse in the arena. Rider may hold onto the egg until instructed to remove thumb from the egg. From that point on, the rider must have his/her hand behind the black line on the spoon and may not touch the egg, hold their thumb over the egg, or hold their fingers under the bowl of the spoon. When asked to change gaits, the rider must do so immediately.

Pole Bending: The course contains six (6) poles set 21 feet apart. Time will begin and end as the horse crosses the timer line. An exhibitor may start either to the right or the left. Knocking over a pole will result in a five (5) second penalty of each pole knocked down. Failure to follow the course shall result in disqualification.

Barrel Racing: Three (3) barrels make up the course. You may start either to the right or left and run to form a cloverleaf. Knocking over a barrel results in a five (5) second penalty for each barrel knocked down. Failure to follow the course shall result in disqualification.

Flag Race: Two (2) barrels make up the course. The rider shall sprint to the first barrel, pick up the flag then sprint to the second barrel turn the barrel and sprint back to the first barrel replacing the flag. Missing the barrel will result in disqualification. There is a 5 second penalty for knock-ing over the second barrel.

Keyhole Race: The course will be made up of a "keyhole" drawn on the ground in white at the far end of the arena. The rider will run into the "keyhole" make a 360 degree turn, exit the key- hole, and back across the timer line. If the horse steps on or over the line there will be no time.

Catalog Race: One barrel is placed at the far end of the arena with a catalog on it. As the contestant crosses the start line, a page number is called out. The rider rides to the barrel and tears out the page,. Dismounting is allowed, but not required. Rider runs back across the start line. No time for those who bring the wrong page.

Break & Out: This is a command class. All entrants will follow the command of the announcer. Riders have three strides to begin the new com-mand and must maintain that command until a new one is announced. Failure to do so will result in being called in. When

cantering/loping, a correct lead is required.

- Queen Contestants must be at least age 16 but no older than 20 years of age as of June 1 of the year entering the local contest. Junior Contestants must be at least 10 years of age and not over 15 years of age by June 1.
- Be certified as the winner by the local fair where she was crowned.
- Have not been a former local Fair Queen winner, nor a former PA Fair Queen contestant.
- Not hold any other State title for any other commodity group or pageant during her reign.
- Have her parent(s)' or guardian(s)' consent to enter the competition.
- Be single, have never been married, have not been pregnant nor given birth to a child.

- Meet all time commitments, Queen obligations, and "Dress Code" as set forth by the PA Fair Queen Program

Beaver Community Fair Queen/Royalty Program Rules:

Each contestant must meet at least one of the following criteria:

1. Be a resident of Snyder County, Pennsylvania.
2. Be a registered student of a Snyder County school or university.
3. Be a member of a Snyder County 4H club or FFA chapter.
 - The winner must not marry, nor become pregnant during her reign.
 - Must attend an orientation meeting.
 - Must agree to follow the rules set forth by the State Fair Queen Committee in order to compete at the state competition in January where a \$1500 scholarship toward education will be awarded to the winner.
 - Must meet the requirements set forth by the Beaver Community Fair Queen Committee as stated below.

Note: The Pennsylvania Fair Queen Program is the governing body of all county fair queen programs. Any additional rules put in place by the Beaver Community Fair Queen Program are additional to the rules set by the PA Fair Queen Program.

Behavior Policy

The Contest's governing Board shall have the sole discretion to determine whether, in its judgment, the Queen, Alternate, or contestants may continue to participate in the program, in the event that the Board determines that any statement or representation is not true and accurate, or that any action is inconsistent with the rules, standards and dignity of the Program.

The following will be considered violations of the Policy and will be grounds for immediate disqualification, dismissal and/or being banned from future Queen competitions:

- Any infractions of any Queen Contest rules.
- Smoking, drinking alcoholic beverages, chewing gum, foul language and/or public displays of affection to dates/boyfriends while wearing the crown and/or sash and representing the Queen Program.
- Engagement in any illegal, unpartisan, unethical, indecent, and/or morally questionable behavior, including but not limited to online representations on the internet such as social networking sites (including but not limited to Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest) – members of the Queen Committee reserve the right to view your public social media sites prior to the pageant and during the royalty's reign.
- Use of any illegal controlled dangerous substances or abusing the use of alcohol or other dangerous substances.
- Any defamation of the Queen Contest, its winners and contestants, and the Fair or the PA Fair Queen Program and their Directors and Committee Members, whether it be oral or written. This includes postings on the internet.
- Any uncooperative or unsportsmanlike conduct before, during or after the competition.
- Appearing in crown and banner at any event without an official invitation from an authorized event coordinator or event board member.

Dress Code

Wearing of the crown and/or sash is to be considered an honor and privilege. The bearer is now an ambassador representing herself, her family, her community, and Fair. While fashion styles may change, good taste does not!

Therefore responsible, appropriate and professional appearance is expected while wearing the crown and sash.

- Attire that is conducive to the specific appearance or event (i.e. business casual, formal, etc.)
- No jeans, sneakers, flip flops or boots. Alterations may be made to this jean-footwear rule only if severe weather or unsafe conditions exist and the Fair Queen committee's official coordinator or Board Member has approved an alteration consistent with the professional appearance expectation.
- It is strongly recommended that closed toe shoes be worn when in livestock areas, for safety reasons.
- No visible piercings (other than earrings) or tattoos.

- No outfit that shows cleavage.
- Dresses/skirts must be no shorter than the height of a dollar bill (approx. 2.5”) from the bottom of the dress/skirt hem to the top of the knee cap.
- No clothing that advertises, promotes, or glorifies the use of alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or anything inconsistent with the dignity of the Queen Program.

Pageant Judging

The pageant consists of off-stage and on-stage portions. Contestants and a parent/guardian must report to the stage no later than 15 minutes prior to the contest start.

Off-Stage - No entry fee required.

1. Contestants will help with ribbon distribution at youth livestock shows and other activities throughout the week.
2. On Saturday morning of the fair, contestants will be interviewed by a panel of judges, utilizing your biographical information, knowledge of the fair and agriculture industries, and other questions. Computer presentations are not permitted.
3. Dress in Business Attire.

On-Stage - All activities will take place at 2pm on Saturday

1. Speech judging and crowning will take place on Saturday afternoon of fair, to be held on the stage. Dress in formal attire (i.e. prom).
2. Judging for Queen and Junior contestants will consist of:
 - Presentation of speech on "Why You Should Come To My Fair" (3 to 5 minutes)
 - Written essay of 300 words or less "What My Fair Means to My Community" (Queen Contestants Only)
 - Junior Contestants will answer a random question.
 - Poise, appearance, neatness and ability to communicate.

Garden Tractor General Rules –\$10 Entry Fee Per Class

1. All contestants must independently operate their tractor in a safe manner.
2. Youth pullers MUST have an adult accompanying them at all times ON and OFF the track. (Youth are 14 years of age and <).
3. Contest committee reserves the right to reject any and all entrees.
4. All tractors weight and hitch height will be checked by an official before entering the pull staging area.
5. Each tractor may enter only once per class.
6. Contestants must keep one hand on the steering wheel and their butt on the seat. Any unsafe behavior will result in disqualification.
7. Any weights lost while hooked to the sled will result in disqualification.
8. Puller will be disqualified if the tractor goes out of bounds or exceeds the speed of any pace device.

9. All tractors must be equipped with wheelie bars or other such device to keep tractors from “flipping back”.

10. All weight brackets, hitches, and wheelie bars must be made of good construction and securely fastened.
11. Rear weights may not protrude more than 2” beyond rear tires.
12. All pullers must wear a helmet.

Stock Rules

1. Engine must be governed not to exceed a maximum of 4000 rpm’s.

1. No alcoholic beverages allowed on the grounds. Any signs of alcohol or illegal drugs being used is an immediate disqualification.
2. Each tractor may be entered in more than one class, but only once in each class.
3. Tractors must weigh-in prior to start of contest. Weight will be taken with the operator on the tractor. The puller is to light weigh his tractor, and then move off the scales to weigh-up so as not to hold up the weigh-in process. The flagman will have the option to spot re-weigh any contestant. Once a tractor is weighed and RPM checked, it will be driven to the staging area, and remain there until it pulls. No return to pits after it is weighed in for a pull.
4. The tractor operator must be 18 years of age or at least 16 years of age with parent's/guardian's signed consent.
5. Driver must remain seated during the pull and have complete control of the tractor at all times.
6. Tractors must be operated in a safe manner at all times, on and off the track, or will be disqualified.
7. No portion of the tractor shall interfere with the sled or sled hitching device during a pull.
8. Contestant has three (3) minutes from the time the sled has backed into place to be hooked to pull.
9. All pulls must start from a tight hitch. No jerking permitted during the pull. Contestants will be allowed two (2) attempts to move sled for official measurement.
10. First puller of each class will be test puller, and may take that pull of the sled if it is set correctly and the puller feels they did well. All other contestants must pull in the position drawn. First puller may choose to come back and pull again in third position for pace classes or last for non-pace classes.
11. All tractors must stop immediately at the request of the judge. The pull shall be over when forward motion stops. The judge shall hold hole digging to a minimum. When contestants are red flagged they must stop their units and shut down immediately.
12. Tractors must remain within boundaries of contest course during the pull or the pull will be disqualified. Any unit crossing the white chalk boundary line during the pull will be disqualified.
13. All weights must be safely secured to the tractor. If anything is lost during the pull, while hooked to sled, the pull will result in a disqualification.
14. No extra riders will be allowed on any vehicle at any time.
15. Failure to comply with these rules will disqualify any contestant. Rules will be enforced.
16. Committee has the right to reject any or all entries if they do not comply with association's rules.
17. No standing or downward pressure on hitch while being measured.

18. Flagman has discretion on oil and water spilled.
19. Must be 3 entries per class to run.
20. Pace classes will be run by pace device. Beaver Fair pace device supersedes all other speed recording devices.
21. Sled will be spotted in center of track for all pullers.
22. In a pull off situation there will only be one attempt to pull.
tractor will not be allowed to pull any remaining classes.
the tractor exceeds 3,200 RPM the tractor will be barred from pulling at that event and all purse monies, if any has been accumulated by that will be used.
